## GOOD ROADS BOOSTERS HOLD MEETING

A meeting of good roads boosters was held in the Elk's building Wednesday morning for the purpose of forming a local Old Trails Association, which will work in conjunction with the national organization in bringing about better road conditions and advertising the southern route.

The meeting was called to order by T J Kirken, who is sent out by the national organization, and after some discussion it was decided that a committee call on interested parties and enroll a membership. Seventeen members were taken into the organization of which R C Kaufman was elected chairman and M W Dadey secretary and treasurer.

The matter of making a road to the mountains over which pleasure seekers from Winslow may take an outing, is drawing the attention of the organization and is proposed that all members contribute as much as possible towards that end either in work or cash.

It is estimated that 50,000 automobiles will pass through Winslow this coming summer enroute to the exposition, and good roads leading to the scenic attractions of this state will do more than anything else towards bringing motoring sight-seers into this country every summer. The Packard Company alone will send 200 machines through here about the middle of June.
